

DEFENSE PLANS TO TEAR DOWN CONLEY TALE

Expect to Prove Frank Innocent by Discrediting Negro's Story of Phagan Crime.

Warned that the state is being practically all of its expectations of sending Leo M. Frank to the gallows on the dramatic story told by Jim Conley, the defense this week is completing the collection of a strong line of evidence with which it is planned utterly to discredit the negro's statements and his testimony in court.

Conley again has insisted on confronting Frank. He says he is certain if he can meet the faculty superintendent face to face he can make him "tell the whole story." The negro has told the detectives he not only is willing, but is eager to repeat in the presence of Frank the story of the disposal of Mary Phagan's body just as he has related it a dozen times since he first made the sensational acknowledgment that he had a part in the crime.

It is regarded as most unlikely that the two will be brought together. Luther Z. Rosser, attorney for Frank, has refused to make any definite statement of his attitude for the matter, but it is known he looks with suspicion on every word and every statement by which Conley seeks to ed himself with the case after his remained silent for ten months after his arrest. Frank, however, will take the separate details of the negro's affidavit, one by one, and will show that in the light of the evidence he is utterly ridiculous.

Chief of Police Beavers Monday prepared formal charges against eight police officers, the revolutionaries who killed conductor in a riotous negro raid in the city of Atlanta.

Chief Beavers said Monday that the resignation would not be accepted, but that it would be sent to the Police Commission along with the charges.

## NET TO THREAT TO WASTE BUDGET

Governor Declares He Must Have Appropriations Bill Ten Days Before Adjournment.

Governor Slaton has sent word down the line, and it is sure to be applied as steel, that the Legislature must bring out the general appropriations bill at least ten days before final adjournment, or face the prospect of an executive veto.

Governor Slaton is known to have long very positive and precise ideas of what the general appropriation bill should carry, and he is going to insist that the General Assembly take the matter in the matter of keeping that bill within the State income.

Heretofore the practice has been to bring in the general appropriations bill at the very last moment, leaving the Executive to wrestle with it all night, or to let it pass.

This year, however, the Governor has determined that he shall have that bill ten days before adjournment, in order that he may return it to the House and Senate, if necessary, with such recommendations and changes as he may think proper.

Blame to Be Shared. Responsibility for the greatly wasted money has been distributed fairly and justly between the Executive and Legislative Departments.

Governor Slaton, who served sixteen years in the Legislature, knows the methods of both houses thoroughly, and he knows how the General Assembly frequently has embarrassed the Executive Department in the matter of making impossible appropriations.

That he will stand for none of that, now that he is the Governor, already is an open declaration to the "Rag" mind.

Representative Crawford Wheatley, who is to be the chairman of the General Appropriations Committee, discussing this matter today, said:

"I think the Governor's attitude is proper and just what it should be. I shall do my part in helping him with my vote, and he will do his part in helping me with his vote."

"After the House gets through with it it will originate in the House, and it will go to conference, and then to the Governor."

"That will take a great deal of time. At the same time I think the Governor should have ten days before we adjourn, so that we will give all time to get together."

"Governor Slaton has started out right, in my opinion, and I for one will cooperate with him as far as I can."

The General Assembly will not be able to transact much business until after the 15th of July.

Speaker Burwell and President Anderson hope to get their committee report on the bill by tomorrow, but it may be Wednesday before it is reported.

Already more than a hundred bills have been introduced, and it is generally expected that there will be no more bills introduced after the 15th of July.

He has given the impression that he is not unwilling for his client to face the negro, but that he regards the course as most improper place for the meeting and the actual trial of Frank as the proper place.

At the same time, it is expected that the defense will be able to show that in the light of probabilities they are utterly absurd and silly that they are utterly absurd and silly.

Particular emphasis will be placed on the fact that the negro has lied consistently more times in the story he has told of his connection with the crime. The defense will take the position that it is most unreasonable for the State after the "Rag" has made two affidavits admittedly perjurious, to base its case on a third affidavit which it holds is absolutely true.

In the firm belief that Conley's renewed demand to be brought face to face with Frank is a mere subterfuge by which the negro is seeking to shift the blame for the crime, Attorney Rosser is expected to give him a most merciless grilling when he is called to the witness stand by the State.

The defense makes no secret of its expectation of bringing down the negro's story. An open court confession would not surprise them, they say.

Solicitor Dorsay and his associate in the prosecution, Frank A. Hooper, indicate the possibility that the negro will make a confession on the witness stand. Mr. Hooper said Monday morning that he believed the negro would make an excellent witness probably the most valuable one the State would call. He did not believe that Conley would be able to stand the fire of questions from Attorney Rosser and Reuben Aftand, both of whom have a wide reputation for the making cross-examination to which they can subject a person in the witness chair.

"I have not any thought that 'he will fall,'" said Mr. Hooper. "He has told me a clear, straightforward story, and he is a man of a high mind. He can not be confused and the course of course, will not permit him to be intimidated about there being any effort of the sort on the part of the cross-examiner, which I do not anticipate."

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
