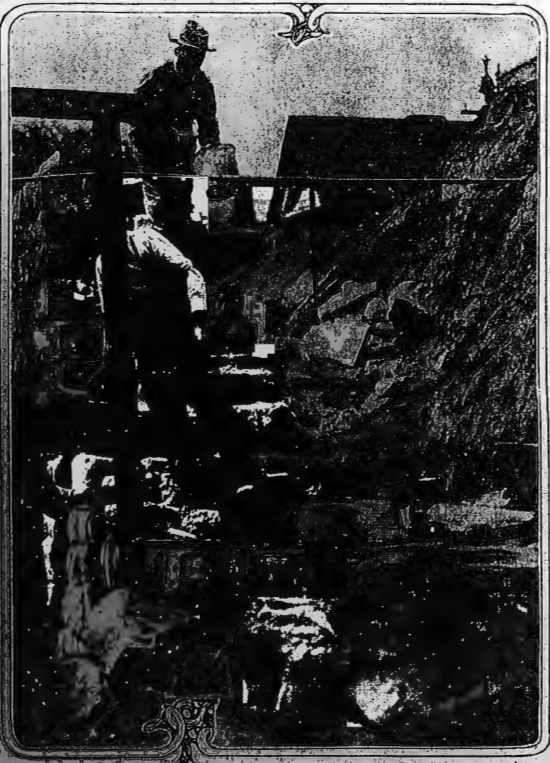

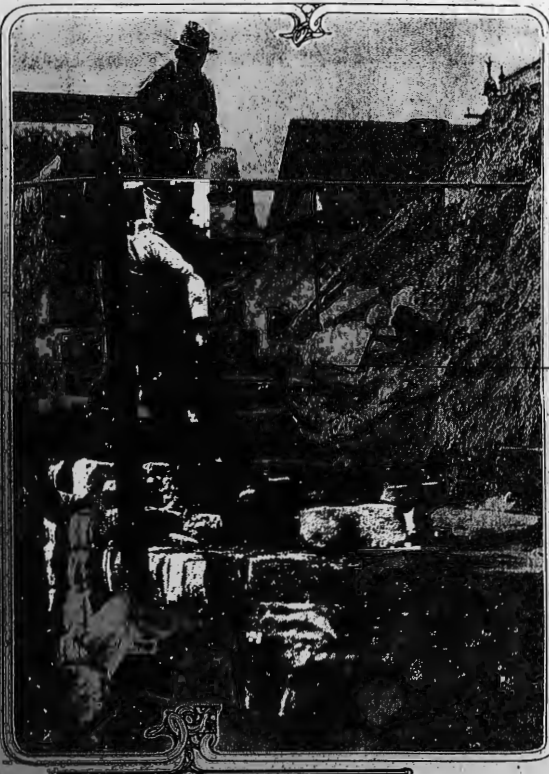

MACON, July 2.—Church people here are greatly agitated today over the investigation by the executive committee of the First Christian Church into the alleged intimacy of two of its most prominent members—Professor Frank M. Charlton, leader of the choir, and Mrs. Marvin Lee Lester, secretary of the Ladies' Aid Society.

The alleged improper conduct as charged by two neighbors of Mrs. Lester, Mrs. J. W. Jenkins and Mrs. Alma Armstrong, is said to have occurred on the night of June 5, when a telephone conversation between the Professor and Mrs. Lester was overheard by Mrs. Jenkins. It is alleged, according to Mrs. Jenkins, who is on the same telephone line with Mrs. Lester, Professor Charlton asked Mrs. Lester if Mr. Lester were in.

Nothing further was heard of the "burglary" until June 21, when The Macon News published an sensational story of the affair using the names A. B. C. Cooper of the paper were then mailed anonymously to Mrs. Lester and Mrs. Charlton, and the church investigation followed on Saturday.

WIDOW NOT TOLD OF MAN'S FALL TO DEATH

Relative Goes to Illinois to Break News, Fearing the Effect of Telegraphic Message.

The body of William Newburn, the steel worker who fell to his death from the ninth story of the Healey building Monday afternoon, was shipped Tuesday morning to the old home at DeFow, Ill., where a kindly wife awaits his coming.

She thinks alive, for she does not know her husband is dead.

Not until Tuesday night, when F. A. Weber, brother-in-law and fellow workman with Newburn, who hastened away from Atlanta late Monday afternoon, arrives at the little home to break the news, she would not trust a telegram, he said, for the terrible news would kill her if it were broken in that way.

Weber, "Billy's" aidepartner on the steel, and now the messenger of his death, was an eyewitness to the tragedy Monday afternoon.

Newburn, he says, was standing on the ninth floor of the big skyscraper, when the big derrick, which rears itself to a height several stories above the top floor, swung a pile of lumber for up and down over the edge of the steel framework.

Something went wrong. There was a sudden slipping of three pieces of the lumber pile. Weber, from his perch on the derrick, saw it slipping directly toward the spot where Newburn stood. He called out frantically, once, twice, but it was too late.

The three big pieces of lumber fell with a crash, knocking Newburn over and into the air. He fell to the second floor, the body fell from such a distance with so much force that it knocked a hole several feet in circumference in the flooring of the second floor.

"Break bunches of celery open and wash all the stalks before they are eaten," says the Department.

It is all on account of dried Bordeaux mixture, which is lime and copper sulfate, with which growers apply the plants to prevent destruction by blight.
