'PURE SHOE' BILL BEFORE STATE SENATORS

Another Measure Would Make the Sale of Exchange of Pistols a Misdemeanor.

Among the measures introduced in the Georgia Senate Wednesday was a "pure shoe" bill and a bill to prevent the sale of pistols. The first was introduced by Senator J. T. Peyton, of the Thirty-third, and the last by Senator W. S. H. Spence, Sr., of the Twenty-sixth.

Senator Peyton's "pure shoe" bill prohibits the sale of boots and shoes as of leather construction when other material is substituted. Unless the substitution is made in plain print on the box, violation is made a misdemeanor. The bill was referred to the committee on agriculture.

Senator Spence's anti-pistol bill makes the sale or exchange of a pistol a misdemeanor. It was referred to the committee on special judiciary.

Many bills introduced were: By Senator Peyton—Providing for the appointment of a commission of five members to receive offers for the sale or exchange of the Executive Mansion, and for a new site, and to report to the next General Assembly; amending the act of 1911, regulating the sale of fertilizer, creating a department of public roads and highways, with a commissioner at \$1,000 salary; amending the code to correct census figures rendered inaccurate by the creation of new counties.

SLADE IS CAUSTIC IN CRITICISM OF STATE MILITIA

Law Needed to Prevent Cowardly Shooting of Innocent Persons, He Declares.

Threats of Atlanta officers to resign from the Georgia National Guard should the bill pending before the Legislature providing for placing that body under the control of the civil authorities be adopted, drew a caustic remark from Representative John J. Slade, of Muscogee County, father of the bill, Wednesday morning.

Officers declared such a law would convert them into a "bullet squad." Mr. Slade's comment was that he had no objection to such a squad. "The military are welcome to commit suicide rather than go down to Augusta and again murder three innocent citizens, and in like cowardly manner shoot at a woman and child."

FRANK IS WILLING FOR STATE TO GRILL HIM

Accused Man Declares He's Anxious Even for Prosecution to Cross-Examine.

Surpassing in interest any of the other testimony at the trial of E. B. Frank, Frank will be the story related on the stand by the accused man himself. That Frank will make a detailed statement of his movements on the day that Mary Phagan was murdered is regarded as one of the certainties of the trial.

It was learned Wednesday that Frank was desirous of going even further than this by being sworn and submitting to a cross-examination by the attorneys for the prosecution. He will request his lawyers, Luther Z. Rosser and Reuben H. Arnold, that the privilege of cross-examination be extended to him.

The defense consistently has refused to divulge any of the details of its plans for the trial and for this reason it is impossible to say positively that Frank will be cross-examined. That it is not at all improbable, however, is indicated by the readiness with which Mr. Rosser permitted Frank to go before the coroner's inquest and answer every question that was propounded to him.

It was not convinced of his innocence, said Mr. Rosser at that time, "that I didn't hesitate an instant in giving consent to any sort of an examination that might give him." As grilling and searching as was the inquisition before the coroner's jury, the ordeal at the trial will be much more severe. At the inquest, Frank was interrogated by a coroner who was merely seeking enough evidence to warrant the holding of Frank, along with New Lee, to the grand jury.

At the trial Frank will be confronted by two trained and battle weary lawyers who have announced their intention that he be in the main guilty of the murder of Mary Phagan.
