

# PRESIDENT STIRS GETTYSBURG THROUGH Crackers Lead Pelicans By One Run

## MISSISSIPPI EXPRESS IS LOOTED

Masked Robbers Hold Up Illinois Central Passenger at Lonely Spot South of Memphis.

MEMPHIS, TENN., July 4.—Illinois Central train No. 1 bound from Chicago to New Orleans, was held up by four masked men early today and one-half miles south of Blountville, Miss.

It was believed the men obtained \$25,000, although the local officials of the American Express Company say the amount was not that large.

Officials here of the railroad reached Memphis offices of the Illinois Central just before noon. The message said the bandits seized the train at the Tallahatchie River bridge, near Blountville, Miss., and compelled Engineer A. E. Norton to abandon his car.

The negro train was kept in the engine car, guarded by a bandit who held him covered with a revolver, while the others went back and unlooted the passenger coaches. From the mail, baggage and express cars.

The negro freight train was held up in the same spot. The bandits took the express and baggage cars and left the freight train to proceed on its way.

A special train arrived from Jackson, Miss., bringing officers and bloodhounds to hunt for the bandits. It is believed the bandits fled to the north.

Officials of the road say they believe the hold-up men were the same ones who have held up several trains in the last few months in the South.

The first was in Mississippi, on the Queen and Crescent, near Memphis, when robbers stopped a train and rifled the express car. The amount was estimated at \$10,000.

## MISSISSIPPI EXPRESS IS LOOTED

Masked Robbers Hold Up Illinois Central Passenger at Lonely Spot South of Memphis.

MEMPHIS, TENN., July 4.—An Illinois Central train No. 11 bound from Chicago to New Orleans, was held up by four masked men early today and one-half miles south of Memphis, Miss.

It was believed the men obtained \$25,000, although the local officials of the American Express Company, say the amount was not that large.

Official news of the hold-up reached 3 months' office of the Illinois Central just before noon. The message said the bandits flagged the train at the Tallahatchie River bridge, near Nashville, Miss., and compelled engineer A. E. Norton to abandon his car.

Following the robbery the bandits ran the engine less than a mile south when they under the engine went out. Believing the negro fireman had allowed the fire to die in order to trick them, the bandits threw him out of the cab while the engine was moving rapidly. He was severely injured. The men abandoned the engine one mile east of Hazel, Miss., and entered the forest.

A special train arrived from Jacksonville, bringing out Jack and Mack. A party of Deputy United States Marshals from Memphis, left Memphis on the train for the bandits. Car Nearly Wrecked.

Sherrif W. Lemaster, of Batesville, was the first to reach the express car after the bandits left. He found the car nearly wrecked. He was getting into a crack in the safe, which was not completely demolished," said Sheriff Lemaster, "to take up the chains for the bandits."
