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DEPARTMENT TO GOVERN BANKS PROPOSED

Bill, in Both House and Senate, Provides for Supervisor of State Institutions.

A bill providing for the creation of a department of banking in Georgia and supervising approximately 100 State banks in Georgia was presented Monday to the House and Senate.

The bill, if passed, will reorganize the existing department of State banks, so it will take such supervision entirely from the hands of the State Comptroller and his assistants.

Harvey M. Madden, secretary of the Georgia Bankers' Association, said Monday morning that he hopes for the bill to be introduced in the House and Senate Banking Committee, which may do as they see fit.

"The bill is a good one, we think," said Mr. Madden, "and if passed will be a great benefit in the supervision of the State banks, which are now scattered in the State Comptroller and his two assistants."

Declare Present Scheme Would Deliver Price-Making Power Into England's Hands. One of the Oldest Institutions in Pittsburg Ordered by U. S. Comptroller to Suspend.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Southern planters are protesting the Senate Finance Committee against the provision in the tariff bill taxing cotton exchange dealers 25 per cent.

This provision was inserted in the tariff bill by Senator Simmons to meet the demand that there shall cease all gambling in cotton futures and on margins. It resulted from attempts to curb the cotton market speculation by operators on the New York Cotton Exchange.

The planters contend that with such a tax, amounting to about 50 cents a bale of cotton, no exchange can continue to do business. The planters are opposed to the New York Exchange, but they want the New Orleans and other Southern cotton exchanges to continue.

Defiant South's Exchange

In this argument they present it is held that the New Orleans Exchange and other Southern exchanges are essential on the cotton market and to hold the price to the advantage of the Southern grower. These exchanges make actual deliveries.

The New York Exchange is friendly to the spinners and is bearish, its quotations on the cotton market are not based on actual deliveries, but on the spinners' requirements. Its business is done through the interchange of purchase and sales notes.

Elves Power to England

The bill, if passed, will consolidate the method of supervision of State banks as it will take such supervision entirely from the hands of the State Comptroller and his assistants.

Haynes McPhaden, secretary of the Georgia Bankers' Association, said Monday morning that he has no objection to the bill, but that it would be presented to the House and Senate committees, which may do as they see fit.

Bill Called Good One.
The bill is a good one, he thinks, said Mr. McPhaden, "and it passed will be a great benefit to the supervision of the State banks, which are now regulated by the State Comptroller. The present regulation and supervision is entirely inadequate, as is shown when it is brought out that these three men are supposed to conduct examinations of approximately 600 banks each year. Two examinations per year are not sufficient to check these men on inspections to make in 185 days."

The proposed bill provides for the creation of a department of banking which shall be in charge of a superintendent appointed by the Governor for a term of four years, the first term beginning January 1, 1916, and the expiration January 1, 1919.

Office Pay \$4,000 Year.
The superintendent shall receive a salary of \$4,000 a year and shall have the power to appoint from time to time an assistant superintendent, who shall be ex-officio examiner, and such additional examiners and office assistants as may be required to discharge the duties of the office.

The assistant superintendent and several examiners shall be skilled accountants and familiar with the banking business. The assistant superintendent shall receive a salary of \$2,000 per annum, while each assistant shall receive a salary of \$1,000 per year.

Every bank, trust company and other corporation doing a banking business in the State, including private banks, partnerships or voluntary associations and no banking institution shall be subject to supervision by the State department.

Apartment Houses Must Quit Smoking
