

SAYS HE HEARD COLELY CONFESSION WIDOW, LEAVING CITY, EVADES ARREST

CRAWFORD'S WIFE BELIEVES LEGAL

Delay in Hearing Will Mean Woman's Commitment to Jail, Attorney Says.

Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford had disappeared Saturday afternoon when officers went to arrest her on a warrant charging her with the murder of her husband, Joshua B. Crawford, Jr., 1900.

The warrant was sworn out by C. J. Crawford, a neighbor and brother-in-law of the deceased, before Justice of the Peace C. H. Christman.

The first warrant charging Mrs. Crawford with murder was signed by Coroner C. W. Baskin, of Carroll County, who had disinterred the body of Joshua B. Crawford and found evidence of poison.

Colonel J. B. James, attorney for the heirs, said later that he did not know whether both sides would be ready for the commitment trial.

Seeking Crawford Widow With New Warrant

CORONER'S WRIT HELD ILLEGAL

Delay in Hearing Will Mean Woman's Commitment to Jail, Attorney Says.

Following steps upon a decision by Superior Court Justice Pendleton Saturday morning that a warrant signed by the coroner of Carroll County, G. Z. Crawford, a nephew and beneficiary under the \$250,000 will of Joshua B. Crawford, went before Justice of the Peace C. H. Glardestad and swore out a second warrant charging the widow, Mary Belle Crawford, with murder.

Constables R. F. Mauldin and W. W. Rogers went immediately to the home of Mrs. Crawford at West Peachtree and Fourteenth streets, to arrest her and take her before Justice Glardestad for commitment trial.

The first warrant charging Mrs. Crawford with murder was signed by Coroner U. W. Baskin, of Carroll County, who had disinterred the body of Joshua B. Crawford and found evidence of poison. Crawford died in Walton county March 17, 1909.

Hearing May Be Delayed.

The warrant reached Atlanta Friday and Sheriff Mangum notified Mrs. Crawford to appear before Justice of the Peace D. K. Johnson Saturday morning, when a hearing would be held as to the authority of the Sheriff to serve the warrant in Fulton County.

Colonel J. S. James, attorney for the writ, said later that he did not know whether both writs would be ready for the commitment trial, as the prosecution has several material witnesses out of the State.

In the event of delay in the commitment-hearing, he said, Justice Glardestad would have no other alternative than to commit Mrs. Crawford to jail.

Arnold Says Exonerated.

Attorney Arnold said Mrs. Crawford would be completely exonerated at the prospective hearing before a justice of the peace. He held the action was nothing more than a move to "force" civil procedure.

"It is not really the Crawford heirs who are fighting me," said Mrs. Crawford, "but the rather distant relatives who were not mentioned in any will. I settled with the real heirs according to the will left by Mr. Crawford's first wife. Every one was satisfied."

I gave Charlie Crawford more than he was even entitled to by the will that was made before I even knew the man I later married. He thanked me for the generosity by later letting the very distant relatives prevail upon him to fight me. He decided then an interest in his hand of the property and filed suit. Since then he has fought me. The closer relatives have never been anything but my best friends.

Sheriff Mangum will select the Justice Court for the hearing instead of the attorneys. It is more than likely it will start in the forenoon, and it is not improbable it will be necessary to conclude Monday.

Widow's Side of Case.

Attorney Arnold, for Mrs. Crawford, issued the following statement Friday afternoon:

"There is nothing whatever new in the recent developments of the Crawford case.

"Four years after Crawford's death Mrs. B. Crawford and his first wife, who are seeking to recover the estate worth perhaps \$100,000, from the widow and legatees under Crawford's will, went to Carroll County with their lawyer, J. S. James, and Dr. H. F. Harris, and on some kind of a show-up which we know nothing of persuaded the coroner to issue the writ against David. It is false."

Epplains Duke's Doubts.

When I turned it over to him I was convinced of its absolute truth and that it would stand the acid test."

Habes Corpus Ficti Falls.

Habes corpus proceedings to reverse Newt Lee collapsed in the court of Justice Ellis Saturday morning.

By agreement, Bernard L. Chappell, representing Lee, withdrew his application for a habes corpus. Jim Conley underwent a rack-like third degree last Friday afternoon at the hands of Detective Colonel Hugh M. Dorsey and Attorney Frank A. Hooper in an effort to verify or discredit the W. H. Mincey affidavit, in which the negro was charged with confessing to the murder of a girl on the afternoon that Mary Phagan met her death.

The grilling of nearly 400 hours followed the Georgia's publication of the details of Mincey's accusation and was undertaken with the utmost secrecy. An attempt being made to avoid knowledge of the details of the grilling by taking Conley to the Commissioner's room on the second floor of the police station by a circuitous route.

MORTGAGE LAW REFORM LOSES IN HOUSE
Attempt to Reduce Number of Foreclosure Notices Deferred. Committee Report Ignored.

The effort to reform the mortgage law of Georgia so that the mortgage holder would be required before foreclosing to advertise once a week for four weeks instead of for four months prior to the next term of the Superior Court, met with defeat in the House Friday, despite the favorable recommendation of General Judiciary Committee No. 1.

Representative Moss, of Cobb, presented the proposed bill, which was declared to be a bill of "private and local character" and was not to be reported to the House.

Among the new bills filed were: By Fulbright of Burke—Providing for a special tax of one mill during 1913 and 1914 to meet deficiencies.

By Davidson of Fulton, and Sparks of Toombs, presented the bill, Speaker Pro Tem, E. H. McEachern, of Clayton, presented the bill, and the bill was referred to the committee on bills introduced during the session.

The measure provided for the payment of the annual salary of the insurance clerk, and made up a deficiency of \$500 in the 1913 budget.

Four appointments by the Governor were approved by the Senate in executive session. The appointments were L. D. Shannon to be Judge of the City Court of Jeffersonville and H. J. Grimm to be Solicitor and Carl Vinson to be Judge of the County Court of Baldwin and J. D. Howard to be Solicitor.

Among the bills reported from committee with recommendation for passage were: To increase the number of senators to sixteen, and to divide each of the six counties with the largest population shall be a senatorial district.

Other bills are: To amend the laws of Georgia relating to the practice of medicine and creating a State Board of Medical Examiners was reported favorably from committee. These bills were read the second time.
