MEXICO STEALS UNITED STATES CIPHER CODE

State Secrets in Envy Wilson's Messages to Washington Barred. Powers Recall Ministers.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—A copy of the official code of the State Department, containing information worth thousands of dollars to foreign governments, has fallen into the hands of the Mexican Administration.

For some months State Department officials have suspected that the government telegrams from Mexico City have been impounded with, it is declared, but this was not considered important as all the dispatches were in code and, therefore, theoretically illegible.

About three weeks ago, however, Government officials here had their first inkling that the Mexicans were obtaining the gist of the dispatches exchanged between the State Department and Ambassador Wilson.

At first it was suspected that an employee of the department in this city was to blame, but investigation showed this to be impossible. The telegrams were read only by three persons in Washington—the official interpreter, Robert Ross, confidential secretary to Secretary of State Bryan, and the Secretary of State himself.

The agents of the almost unknown secret service of the Mexican government then were put on the trail and evidence was obtained that the telegrams were being intercepted by means of the wires in Mexico and decoded, the information being thereupon transmitted to President Huerta and his staff.

All this information was at times furnished to the State Department in a most uncomplimentary manner. The government in Mexico, the matter at once took on an international aspect, and the State Department's agents to discover the "leak" were recalled, but in vain.

Every effort will be made to locate the copy of the State Department code and destroy it. It would prove a valuable asset if it fell into the hands of a hostile nation, as it would be impossible to replace it and to distribute it all over the world in less than six months.

Italy Orders Minister Home From Mexico City. MEXICO CITY, July 19.—It was learned today that the Italian Minister to Mexico secretly left here last night for Vera Cruz. Significance is attached to his departure, as it is believed he was urgently ordered to leave.

Call this action is doubly impressive on account of the fact that Francis Piccini, Italian minister here, has been succeeded by another and will leave here for London in a few days. The Italian government is apparently alarmed because of the attitude of international diplomacy apparently because of the attitude of the United States and the condition of growing anarchy here.

Ambassador Thinks He Will Lose Post. MEXICO CITY, July 19.—Despite the statement of United States Ambassador Wilson that he expects to return here in his official capacity following the conference at Washington, it was learned today that the Ambassador secretly believes his days in officialdom are numbered.

Before his departure he ordered the removal of a costly silver service and other valuables from his quarters at the State Embassy to United States barracks at Vera Cruz. The families of some of the American Embassy staff were sent to Vera Cruz for safety.

Interest was aroused by the announcement that the Minister of the Interior is working up a plan to conduct a big party at the Hotel Moroles to the 50,000 Japanese colonists.

NEUTRAL OF LUMB \$100,000,000 IN IS FOUGHT BY GOODS AWAIT DEFENSE NEW TARIFF

Crawford Lawyers Ask Delay No Such Material Wealth as Now Is in Our Warehouses Ever Held in Nation's History.

That a strenuous fight is on between the attorneys for Mrs. Mary Hells Crawford and the heirs-at-law of the late Joshua B. Crawford to prevent the return to Georgia of Fred Lumb, the New York bar named as an accomplice of Mrs. Crawford in the alleged plot to poison her husband, became known Saturday morning.

The New York Stock Company also has \$85,000,000 worth of merchandise stored in the bonded warehouses of Greater New York to-day. Never on the face of the globe has there ever been such an aggregation of everything that the soil yields and human industry produces.

The 55 great bonded warehouses are crisscrossed almost to bursting with silks, furs, coffee, spices, oils, rugs, carpets, toys, textile fabrics, knit goods, glassware and pottery, jewelry, hardware, chemicals—with everything in which the merchandise of the world trade.

NEW YORK, July 19.—Prompt action to arbitrate the United States in confirming the appointment of President Wilson to the special board which will arbitrate the difficulties between the 105,000 employees of the Eastern railroads and the railway managers was demanded today by William G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Trainmen, and J. H. Garrison, president of the Order of Railway Conductors.

"Delay or failure to confirm such appointments only makes it more impossible for us to control the situation," they asserted.

Bank Bill Will Get Hearing on Thursday

The new banking bill introduced in the House and which has aroused interest among Georgia bankers will be given a hearing at 8:30 o'clock next Thursday morning before the Banking and Finance Committee, J. C. Cooper, of Ware, chairman.

One banking bill, introduced by Representative R. E. Blackburn, of Fulton, has already been favorably reported. This provides for twenty-five trustees of trust companies instead of fifteen.
