## U. S. Will Refuse to Recognize Huerta

### ENDS SCENE OF MEXICO REGIME

Will Not Last Year Out, President Says—Stronger Successor Is Hoped For.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The United States does not intend to recognize the Huerta government in Mexico, because that administration is reported to be tottering to its fall and is not expected to last the year out.

This was the gist of President Wilson's discussion of the Mexican situation with the Washington correspondents today. The President said that at present he is doing nothing but studying the Mexican problem as to be able to discuss it thoroughly with Ambassador Wilson when the latter returns to Washington Friday.

But he indicated clearly that the administration does not intend to recognize Huerta, no matter what advice the Ambassador gives.

The Chief Executive has been advised of the high authority that President Huerta is losing his grip. It is not considered good policy to recognize a government which has but a short time to live, and the United States will reserve its approbation for another and stronger regime, which, it is hoped, will succeed the Huerta Government.

### LATEST NEWS

WASHINGTON, July 21.—War Department officials declared today that Brigadier General G. K. Evans, in command of the Department of the Gulf, at Atlanta, Ga., has stated publicly that the United States will not recognize Huerta in Mexico. Here are the important developments of Monday in the Phagan case: The decision of the Grand Jury of Fulton County not to bring at this time an indictment against James Conley. The information that there is a strong probability of another postponement of the trial of Leo M. Frank.

The Grand Jury's refusal to reopen the investigation of the Phagan indictment was a decided victory for the Solicitor as that body had overruled his request that no session be called to take up the matter in any of its aspects.

The defense also is said to be in favor of a continuance. 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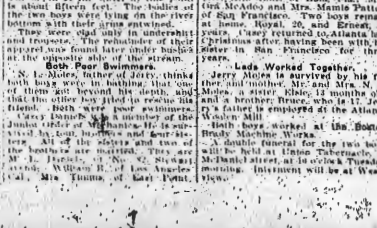
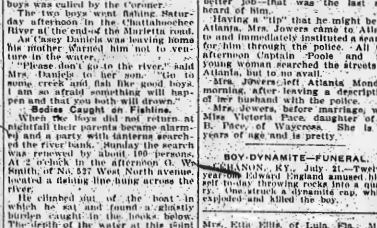
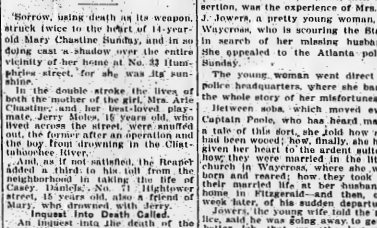

## U. S. WILL REFUSE TO RECOGNIZE HUERTA

### END OF MEXICO REGIME

Will Not Last Year Out, President Says--Stronger Successor Is Hoped For.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The United States does not intend to recognize the Huerta Government in Mexico, because that administration is reported to be tottering to its ruin and is not expected to last the year out.

This was the gist of President Wilson's discussion of the Mexican situation with the Washington correspondents today. The President said that at present he is doing nothing but studying the Mexican problem so as to be able to discuss it thoroughly with Ambassador Wilson when the latter reaches Washington Friday.

That he indicated clearly that the administration does not intend to recognize Huerta, no matter what advice the Ambassador gives.

The Chief Executive has been advised on the highest authority that President Huerta is losing his grip, it is not considered good policy to recognize a government which has but a short time to live, and the United States will reserve its approbation for a stronger and stronger regime, which, it is hoped, will succeed the Huerta Government.

The President today indicated clearly that there would be no further steps in the Mexican matter until after the White House conference scheduled for Friday.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—When the center fielder of the Chicago Bloomer Girls made a Ty Cobb throw in yesterday's game at Union League Park with the Sparrows' Point team, a boy spectator became suspicious of the sex of the blouser player. He jerked the blond wig off the head of the third baseman and exposed to the eyes of thousands of fans the closely cropped head of a man.

They were escorted by a policeman to the depot this morning.

The rest of the "girls" made for the clubhouse, a square away, at top speed. They were besieged by hundreds of angry spectators, who swarmed a squad of police outside, demanding their money back.

### LADS' BODIES CAUGHT ON WASHLINE

All-Day Search Reveals Fate of Jerry Moses, 17, and Casey Daniels, 15 Years Old.

Inquest into the death of young Jerry Moses and Casey Daniels, who were drowned while fishing in the Chattahoochee River Saturday, began this morning. The bodies of the boys were found Sunday morning. Coroner Donohoe said the deaths would be thoroughly investigated.

The bodies were found Sunday afternoon hanging to a trolley by George W. Smith, of No. 527 West North avenue, after an all-day search in the river.

Mr. Smith, who was a member of a large party of searchers who spent nearly the day trying to locate the boys, rowed out alone to the middle of the stream, where he found a trolley that ran from one end of the bank to the other.

Bodies Caught on Hooks.

Having attempted to draw the line up, Mr. Smith found that it was too heavy to manage, and this led to the discovery of the bodies of the two boys, which were found caught in the trolley about midway in the river.

Immediately following the discovery the county police notified Coroner Donohoe, who went to the scene of the tragedy to make an investigation. The bodies, which showed no bruises of any kind, were taken in charge by Police.

Among the theories that have been advanced as to the cause of the deaths of the boys is that while boating on one of their fishing trips, the boys were in an effort to recum him the other kept down him.

Another theory is that in trying to haul up the trolley, the boys were in a mistletoe. It is known that neither boy was a good swimmer and that for this reason Mrs. Moses, mother of young Jerry, had protested against the trip.

The boys, who were inseparable companions, left home early Saturday morning, promising their parents that they would be back by nightfall. Before leaving, the young boys turned over their week's wages to their mother, allowing himself only one dollar for the trip down the river.

When young Moses failed to return home Saturday night, Mrs. Daniels, becoming alarmed, telephoned the county police, who immediately began the search. It was not until 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, however, that her greatest fears were realized.

Boys Chums for Years.

Young Daniels, who is just 15 years old, lived with his mother at No. 21, Highwater street, while his companion, young Jerry Moses, aged 17, resided with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. N. L. Miles, at No. 21 Highwater street.

The boys had been inseparable companions for years, and were said to have been model youths.

### PROTEST OF SOLICITOR DORSEY

Presents Evidence Showing Indictment of Negro Would Hind-er Frank Prosecution.

The Grand Jury Monday decided to take no action at this time looking to the indictment of James Conley, accused of Leo M. Frank in the murder of Mary Phagan.

The Grand Jury came to its decision after Solicitor General Dorsey had presented a mass of evidence to show why the indictment of the negro would hamper the prosecution of Frank. After more than an hour's conference the Solicitor issued this statement:

"I am requested by the Grand Jury to say no action will be taken at this time on the James Conley matter, and that that body will not pass any indictment whatever to anonymous communications."

It is known that the Grand Jury has been flooded with letters on the Phagan case, many of them urging action against Conley, and many urging the Grand Jury to determine whether or not to commence a particular prosecution, or to discontinue an already begun one. The Solicitor General draws the bill of indictment and examines the witnesses, not with a view to the interest of any client, but those to the public interest.

"The whole prosecution from the time the case is laid before him is under his direction, supervision and control,"—Solicitor Dorsey.

A recent Supreme Court decision was cited by Solicitor Dorsey to the Grand Jury when he demanded "hands off" on the Conley indictment. The decision says of the Solicitor: "He is to determine whether or not to commence a particular prosecution, or to discontinue an already begun one. The Solicitor General draws the bill of indictment and examines the witnesses, not with a view to the interest of any client, but those to the public interest."

Both Luther Z. Rosser and Reuben Arnold, Frank's counsel, denied that Mr. Arnold declared he and his colleagues were content of securing the acquittal of their client and, therefore, were ready to go to trial at any time. According to Solicitor Dorsey, Judge L. S. Roun, who will try the case, is not particularly anxious that it come up at this time.

Says Judge Favos Delay.

"I was talking with Judge Roun a short time ago," said the Solicitor, "and from his conversation I gathered that he would rather the trial did not come up before fall, though he did not say so outright."

Shortly before noon Jim Conley was taken from his cell at police headquarters and split off in an automobile by Detectives Starnes and Campbell, the officers who have had complete charge of the negro for several weeks. Inquiry failed to reveal the destination, or purpose of this action, as the negro was out of his cell less than an hour and on his return the same arrest order was maintained.

Solicitor Dorsey was the only person asked to appear before the Grand Jury. Before they adjourned he stated that he was entirely confident that no indictment would be returned against the negro.

"I can not conceive that these men, when they are in possession of the facts of the case, seriously will consider bringing an indictment for murder against Conley," said the Solicitor.

Atlanta Clergymen Argue For and Against Measure Now Before Legislature.

Atlanta's pupils became a forum Sunday for discussion of the Beacy-Bush bill, enactment of which would force the regular reading of the Bible in Georgia's public schools. Many sermons revealed that the preachers are divided on the subject.

The Solicitor's assurance that no indictment would be brought against Conley was taken to mean that he was in possession of evidence which he believed would be sufficient effectually to deter the jurors from charging the negro with the crime.

Can't Predict 'No Bill'.

Conley can not believe that any Grand Jury, with the knowledge of the facts before it, could bring an indictment against Conley," he said.

Asked if he thought that a "no bill" on the charge of murder would be brought out against the negro, the Solicitor refused to make further comment.

It intimated, however, that he would be present at the hearing and that he would fight every effort to lay the formal charge of murder against Conley.

Should the Solicitor be driven back from this position by the Grand Jury again? "I will not say," he said, "but I will be in a position to say whether an indictment can be drawn against Conley as an accessory after the fact, to which he has confessed, or as the actual murderer."
