

# FRANK CASE MAY GO TO JURY LATE THIS AFTERNOON

## SPECIAL MESSAGE ON MEXIC MIDDLE FOR THE CONGRESS

President Wilson at Work on Document and Will Read It in Person to House and Senate.

## AMERICAN VIEWPOINT TO BE MADE VERY CLEAR

Congress Rallying to President Since Huerta Has Stated That Public Sentiment Doesn't Approve.

Washington, August 21.—President Wilson was at work tonight on a special message which he probably will read to both houses of congress next Monday, relating in detail the negotiations which have been conducted through his personal representative, John Lind, with the Huerta government in Mexico.

The decision to make a comprehensive statement on the situation to congress was reached today after the president had concluded that the negotiations between Mr. Lind and Provisional President Huerta, since the exchange of notes had developed no new basis for discussion.

Wilson May Read Message. With his message, the president will present the two notes, setting forth the American suggestions to the Huerta government and its reply. Should he read the document himself, which he is being urged to do by members of his cabinet, and to which he is strongly inclined, it will be the first time since the day of George Washington that a president has communicated a matter of foreign policy in person to the legislative branch of the government.

While there was no information from the white house to indicate what subject it was hoped to accomplish through a message at this time, there was a well-defined belief in official circles that President Wilson thinks the reading of an address which will lay the American viewpoint and the Huerta contentions before congress and the people of this country, and which also will be made public to the world generally, cannot but have an important effect on the situation in Mexico.

Congress Rallyes to Wilson. It is expected to be a partial answer to the intimations of Provisional President Huerta in his note that President Wilson stands alone in his Mexican policy and unsupported generally in the senate today.

## SPEER PREPARING TO FIGHT CHARGES

Judge Will Attend Hearings Before Judiciary Committee—Georgia Delegation to Confer About Action.

Washington, August 21.—Federal Judge Emory Speer, of Georgia, charged with official misconduct in papers filed with the house committee on judiciary, will attend any hearings that the committee may have to take evidence in the case. He telegraphed today to Representative Hughes, of Georgia, a life-long friend and college classmate, asking that he arrange for his appearance at the proper time. Mr. Hughes immediately conferred with Chairman Clayton, of the committee, and later notified Judge Speer that he would be permitted to be present with counsel.

A conference of the Georgia delegation in the house for consideration of the Speer case has been called for tomorrow. The meeting will be held at the capitol and all members of the delegation except Representatives Roddenbery and Edwards, who are out of the city, will attend. The purpose is to consider what course the delegation should adopt in view of the charges made against a federal judge within their state.

It is likely that a subcommittee of two or three will be appointed to review the charges before the committee, a right which Chairman Clayton will accord. The subcommittee will report to the delegation as to whether the charges are sufficiently serious to warrant action, which would probably be in the form of a resolution to be offered in the house by one of their number to impeach the judge. Such a resolution would be referred to the judiciary committee, which will require consideration of the department of justice report next Monday.

Speer's Son-in-Law Denies Reports. Macon, Ga., August 21.—(Special).—A. H. Heyward, Jr., son-in-law of Judge Emory Speer, today gave out a statement in which he brands as false the reports circulating from Washington that the attorney general's special agent in his report to the judiciary contains serious charges against Mr. Heyward.

"Judge Speer needs no defense at my hands," said Mr. Heyward today, "but in so far as the report applies to me I denounce it as maliciously false. I have never been appointed by Judge Speer to any office whatsoever, have occasionally been client of trust in bankruptcy by the creditors and have been appointed by the referees as receiver and trustee of bankrupt estates. Judge Speer has never fixed the amount of my fee in any case. No exception to any fee paid me has ever been made by any creditor or other party at interest. My accounts are on file in the court and wholly disprove the reckless statement that I have dissipated estates. If Attorney General Gregory or his spy, Lewis, is responsible for these statements, he is simply trying to divert criticism from himself on account of his officious meddling with the affairs of the United States judiciary."

At the conclusion of the service the evangelist said that those in the audience who cared to do so might remain and shake hands with Younger. There were a thousand persons present and all remained to congratulate the former member of the James gang on his conversion.

## THAW IS SCHEMING TO FIX THE POINT OF DEPORTATION

Lawyers Have About Decided That Vermont Offers Opportunities for Thaw to Baffle N. Y. Authorities.

## RUMORS OF KIDNAPING EXCITE THE CANADIANS

Thaw Won't Appear in Court Till Next Wednesday and Meanwhile Lawyers Are Perfecting Their Plans.

NO RECONCILIATION WANTED BY EVELYN NESBIT THAW New York, August 21.—Evelyn Nesbit Thaw doesn't want reconciliation with her husband and doesn't believe reports from Sherbrooke that he wants a reconciliation with her.

The last reports of Harry are simply faithful," she said today. "They are the worst yet. What shall I do if that man gets back to New York? He wants to get free in order that he may take his vengeance and kill me."

Sherbrooke, Quebec, August 21.—Until Wednesday of next week, barring unforeseen developments, Harry Kendall Thaw will remain in the Sherbrooke jail. On that day he is to be arraigned in the superior court on a writ of habeas corpus. Between now and that time his battery of Canadian lawyers hope to perfect plans, not to thwart deportation, but to submit to it gracefully—to a point selected by Thaw.

This, in brief, was the status tonight of Mattoawa's fugitive arrested Tuesday near Coaticook, Quebec, and committed to jail here on a defective warrant. Ignorant of the moves made by his lawyers, Thaw has spent his time pacing the length of the narrow corridor in the Sherbrooke jail and was not even aware that the writ of habeas corpus in his case was served on the jailer this afternoon and that but for a timely telephone message he would have been returned in court today with the bench warrant.

How the Incident Arose. This incident, variously described as a blunder, a case of absent-mindedness and an error due to hurry, arose after Superior Judge Gobenzy failed to specify in writing that the writ was returnable before him next Wednesday. He had set this date in chambers, but the writ reading "instanter" when served on the jailer, set that official into instant action, and he had called a carriage and ordered Thaw to dress for an outing when a telephone message from the judge informed him that the latter was leaving for Montreal not to return here as a circuit judge until next week.

Meanwhile District Attorney Conroy, of court in New York, Deputy Attorney General Franklin Kennedy, of Albany, and others primarily interested in getting Stanford White's slayer across the border, seized on the possibility of Thaw's immediate production and sought to find another judge willing to arraign him. But Mr. LaFare, governor of the jail, declined to surrender the prisoner until he had consulted Sheriff Ayler.

The sheriff, after reading the writ, thought he had no time for its return was stated, he had understood from the court that Wednesday was the day and he "allowed" that Thaw had better stay in jail.

Rumors of kidnaping that the New York authorities were trying to kidnap Thaw; that an automobile had been told to whiz him to New York line; that an open clash, perhaps in street battle, was imminent. As a matter of fact, the officers from New York were as much surprised as anyone. They had protested against Thaw's return to New York on Wednesday, but their protests falling, had decided to bide their time, hoping that when arraigned Thaw would be released as a fugitive and promptly snapped up by the immigration authorities as an undesirable.

The governor of the jail, explaining his difficulties tonight, said: "Someone representing himself to be Judge Gobenzy called me on the telephone this afternoon and said Thaw was ready to appear in court here before Wednesday. It was not entirely settled as to the time, because I had been told to produce him Wednesday, tomorrow, and immediately. I found a crowd outside and there were rumors that the prisoner was going to be taken away. Out of course, these were untrue, and I finally straightened matters out by consultation with the sheriff."

## DYNAMITE CHARGE FOR MAYOR GAYNOR

Enough of Explosive to Wreck New York City Hall Found Under Gaynor's Office Window.

New York, August 21.—A deadly charge of dynamite, three whole 10-inch sticks and two halves with a fuse and detonator, was discovered this afternoon near Mayor Gaynor's office window in the city hall. The bureau of combustibles found that the explosive was 40 per cent dynamite, the regulation blasting proportion, and the amount found would, if exploded, have wrecked the city hall.

The mayor was in his office when the dynamite was discovered by a citizen passing through City Hall park. Mr. Gaynor evinced little interest when told of the explosive's proximity and remained apparently undisturbed at his desk while police officers hurriedly drew a cord on about the dynamite to keep back an excited crowd.

No Statement From Gaynor. Mr. Gaynor frequently receives threatening letters, but tonight he would make no statement regarding the possible connection between any previous threat by mail and the dynamite of today. It is just three years ago this month that he was shot in the neck by a so-called crank and so badly wounded that for several days it was feared he would die.

## CONVICTS TO BE PUT ON ILLINOIS HIGHWAYS

Springfield, Ill., August 21.—Sentences of prisoners who do good work on state roads will be commuted ten days for each thirty they work on the highways, Governor Dunne announced today. The honor system will be used; convicts whose terms are under five years will be ineligible, and counties which are beneficiaries of the plan will be required to pay 50 cents a day to maintain each convict employed.

The general opinion is, however, that Frank will know his fate some time Saturday.

WESTERN & ATLANTIC SHOWS RECORD GAIN

Gross and Net Earnings for Year Greatly in Excess of Other Roads

A record gain in the gross and net earnings of the Western and Atlantic railroad for the year just passed was shown in the report submitted to the railroad commission yesterday.

Gross earnings for the year were \$3,189,005.02 as compared with \$2,822,112.48 an increase of \$366,892.54. The net earnings were \$913,184.26 as against \$818,519.12 last year an increase of \$94,665.14.

Operating expenses for the year were \$2,275,820.76 as compared with \$2,103,593.36 an increase for the year of \$172,227.40. It will be seen that in spite of this big increase in operating expenses the railroad paid a handsome additional profit to the lessees over last year showing that the states property is growing more and more valuable every year.

The advance in gross earnings per mile was \$1.979.92 in the net earnings \$993.90 per mile.
